October Highlights

English Language Arts

This month, 6th grade students read the novel Bridge to Terabithia. They focused on comprehension and story elements (characters, setting, plot development). As students answered comprehension questions, they focused on using question words in their answers, writing in complete sentences, and using proper conventions. Students grew invested in the novel and its characters. Taking on the perspective of a main character, students completed a project such as a scrapbook, diary, comic, or map. The theme of Bridge to Terabithia is loyalty of friends and family. Next month, students will independently read a similarly themed novel of their choice.









Math

Continuing on in our geometry unit, students learned about all four quadrants of the coordinate plane. They practiced plotting reflections and finding the distance between points. Then they learned how to calculate the area of triangles and quadrilaterals. Up next is compound shapes.



Science

In Science class this month sixth graders have been learning about atoms and elements. They explored the periodic table, learning names and symbols for some of the elements, and learning how to use the numbers on the table to do atomic math and figure out the number of protons, neutrons and electrons in an atom of any element. They were drawing Bohr models and learning about how our model of the atom has changed over time. Element samples were on display for students to try to distinguish between metals and nonmetals.










Next up in science will be compounds and reactions.





Social Studies

The sixth grade spent the month of October studying maps and learning how to use them. Students did an excellent job and are now about to begin our "Prehistory" unit. We will be studying how nomadic humans hunted and gathered and how farming changed our lives. As we discuss human migration, students will be encouraged to research their own family history and find out what brought our families to the Glenwood City area!

Students in grades 6-12 will be exposed to a variety of developmentally fitting academic and career planning activities throughout middle and high school.
